A survey of family caregivers 18 years and older who care for children and adults with complex medical conditions or disabilities

More than half a million (657,000) adults in Iowa provide care to a family member or friend with complex medical conditions or disabilities — nearly three in ten (27%) adults across the state.

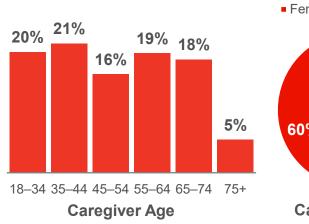
Most family caregivers in Iowa care for an adult (93%) — often a parent (37%). Seventeen percent care for a child with complex medical needs. Most caregivers are married or living with a partner (76%). Two in five caregivers live in a household with income under \$50,000 (39%). Two in five caregivers (39%) are sandwich generation caregivers who care for an adult while also caring for a child under 18. One in four caregivers live with a disability. Three in ten family caregivers live with their care recipient (31%).

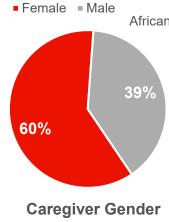
On average, family caregivers are **51 years old** and care for someone **64 years old** in lowa.

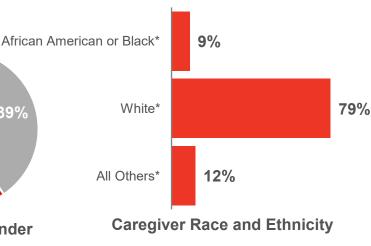
Six in ten family caregivers work while also caregiving (62%).

Most family caregivers in Iowa provide care to someone due to a long-term physical condition (65%).

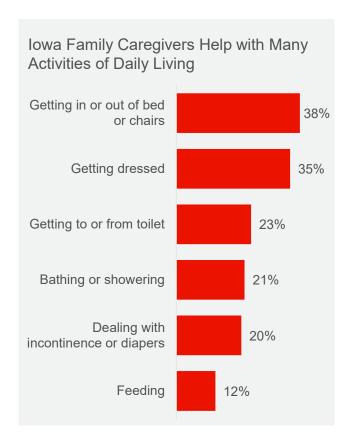


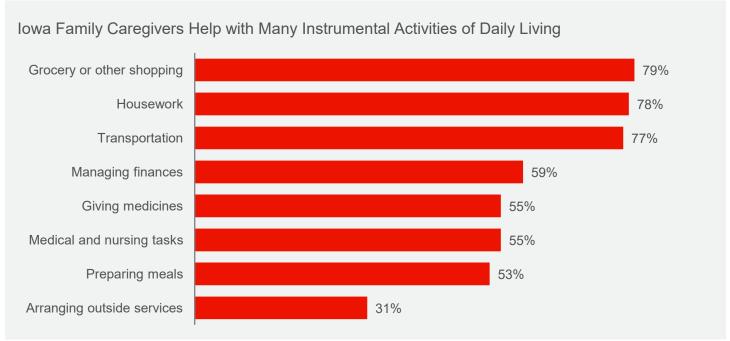
What Family Caregivers Do

Over half of family caregivers in Iowa (55%) assist with at least one activity of daily living (ADL). ADLs are routine tasks that are essential for maintaining personal independence.

Nearly all (99%) family caregivers help with at least one instrumental activity of daily living (IADL), such as shopping, managing finances, preparing meals, and handling transportation.

16% of family caregivers receive training to help with ADLs, IADLs, or behavioral management.





One-third of family caregivers (35%) are high-intensity caregivers, providing more hours of care weekly and helping with more ADLs and IADLs.

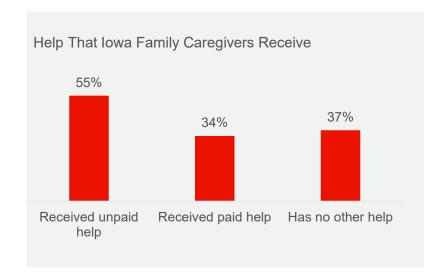
14% of caregivers spend at least 40 hours a week providing care or provide constant care.





What Family Caregivers Do

Family caregivers in lowa rely on unpaid or paid (aides, housekeepers) assistance in their network of support.



48% of caregivers have been providing care for three years or longer.

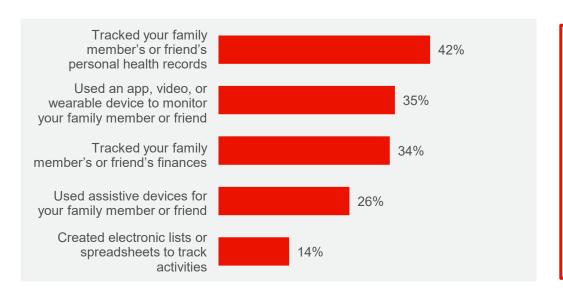
Over half of family caregivers (55%) help with medical and nursing tasks.

Family caregivers in Iowa are key in managing health care:

- 66% monitor the severity of their care recipient's condition.
- 66% communicate with health care professionals about their family member's or friend's care.
- 51% advocate for them with health care providers, community services, or government agencies.

While nearly four in ten (36%) family caregivers would find respite care helpful, nine in ten (89%) have never used such services.

Two-thirds of family caregivers (65%) use at least one of the technology solutions asked about in our survey.



One in five family caregivers (19%) have been asked by health care providers about care needed for their care recipient, and 11% of caregivers have been asked by such providers about care needed for themselves.





Financial Situation of Family Caregivers

Over half of family caregivers (54%) in Iowa have experienced at least one negative financial impact because of their care responsibilities. Common negative impacts include stopping saving, using up personal savings, and taking on more debt.

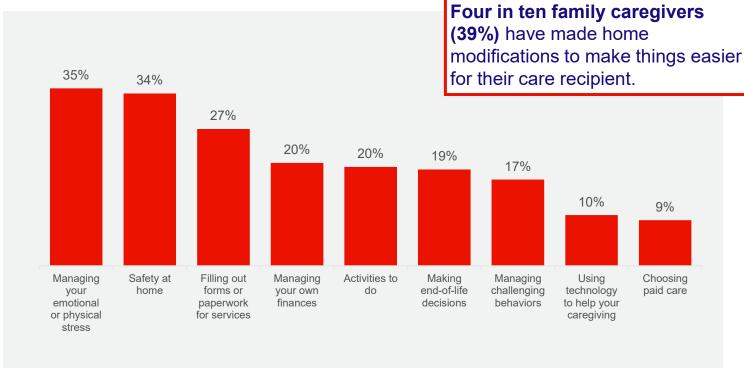
Three in ten family caregivers (30%) have difficulty getting local affordable services such as delivered meals, transportation, or in-home health services.

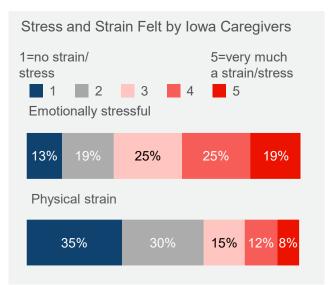




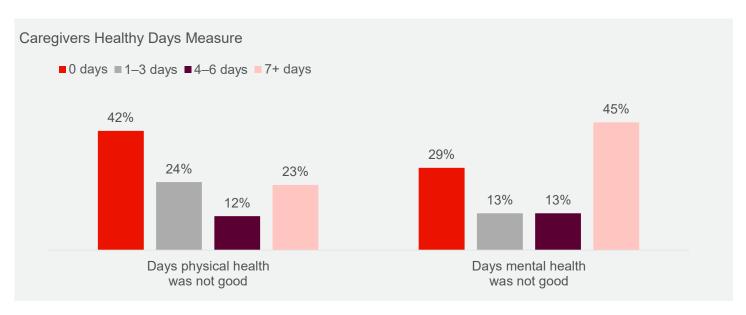


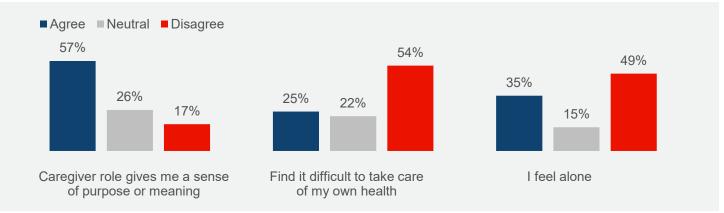
Well-Being of Family Caregivers





One quarter of family caregivers experience seven or more days a month of poor physical health. Over four in ten caregivers (43%) experience high emotional stress while caregiving. One quarter (25%) have difficulty taking care of their own health while they focus on their care recipient's needs. Just over one-third (35%) feel alone while caregiving.

The data in this report reflects 115 caregivers in Iowa, all sampled from Ipsos' national, probability-based online Knowledge Panel®; the margin of sampling error is ±12.3%.
