Pennsylvania

A survey of family caregivers 18 years and older who care for children and adults with complex medical conditions or disabilities

More than 2 million (2,388,000) adults in Pennsylvania provide care to a family member or friend with complex medical conditions or disabilities — nearly one quarter (23%) of adults across the state.

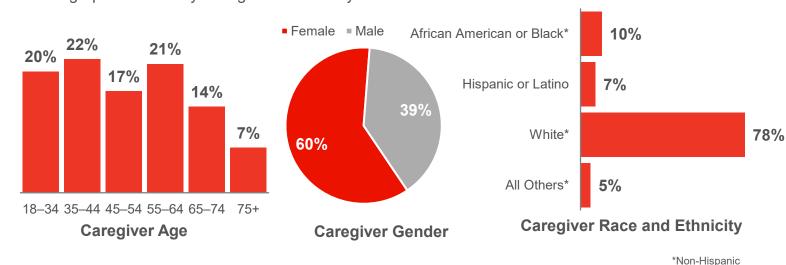
Most family caregivers in Pennsylvania care for an adult (92%) — most often a parent (38%). Fifteen percent care for a child with complex medical needs. Most caregivers are married or living with a partner (67%). One quarter of caregivers live in a household with income under \$50,000 (24%). One-third of caregivers (34%) are sandwich generation caregivers who care for an adult while also caring for a child under 18. One in ten caregivers live with a disability. Four in ten family caregivers live with their care recipient (42%).

On average, family caregivers are 50 years old and care for someone 65 years old in Pennsylvania.

Seven in ten family caregivers work while also caregiving (70%).

Most family caregivers in Pennsylvania provide care to someone due to a long-term physical condition (57%).

Demographics of Family Caregivers in Pennsylvania





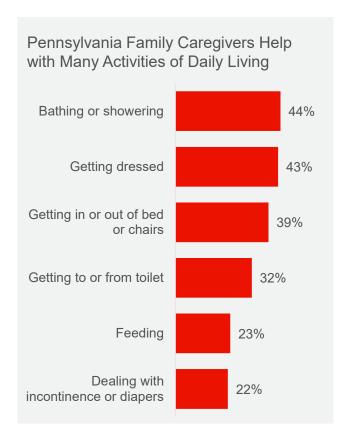


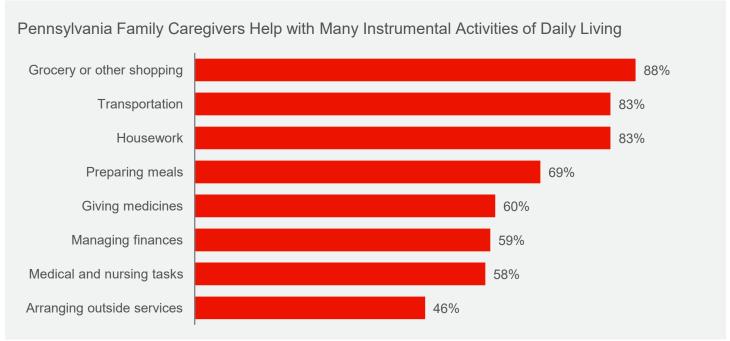
What Family Caregivers Do

Two-thirds of family caregivers in Pennsylvania (64%) assist with at least one activity of daily living (ADL). ADLs are routine tasks that are essential for maintaining personal independence.

All family caregivers help with at least one instrumental activity of daily living (IADL), such as shopping, managing finances, preparing meals, and handling transportation.

9% of family caregivers receive training to help with ADLs, IADLs, or behavioral management.





Nearly half of family caregivers (46%) are high-intensity caregivers, providing more hours of care weekly and helping with more ADLs and IADLs.

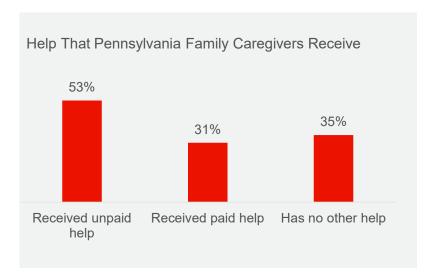
32% of caregivers spend at least 40 hours a week providing care or provide constant care.





What Family Caregivers Do

Family caregivers in Pennsylvania rely on unpaid or paid (aides, housekeepers) assistance in their network of support.



44% of caregivers have been providing care for three years or longer.

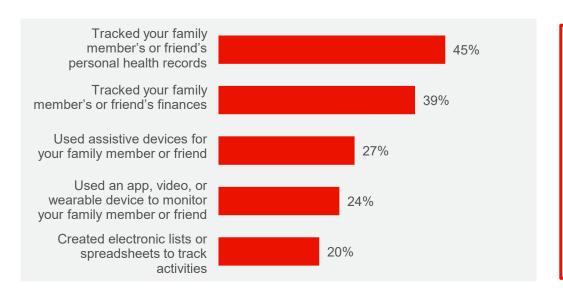
Over half of family caregivers (58%) help with medical and nursing tasks.

Family caregivers in Pennsylvania are key in managing health care:

- 74% monitor the severity of their care recipient's condition.
- 73% communicate with health care professionals about their family member's or friend's care.
- 58% advocate for them with health care providers, community services, or government agencies.

While four in ten (39%) family caregivers would find respite care helpful, nine in ten (90%) have never used such services.

Two-thirds of family caregivers (67%) use at least one of the technology solutions asked about in our survey.



Three in ten family caregivers (31%) have been asked by health care providers about care needed for their care recipient, and 21% of caregivers have been asked by such providers about care needed for themselves.





Financial Situation of Family Caregivers

Four in ten family caregivers (39%) in Pennsylvania have experienced at least one negative financial impact because of their care responsibilities.

Common negative impacts include stopping saving, using up savings, and borrowing money from family or friends.

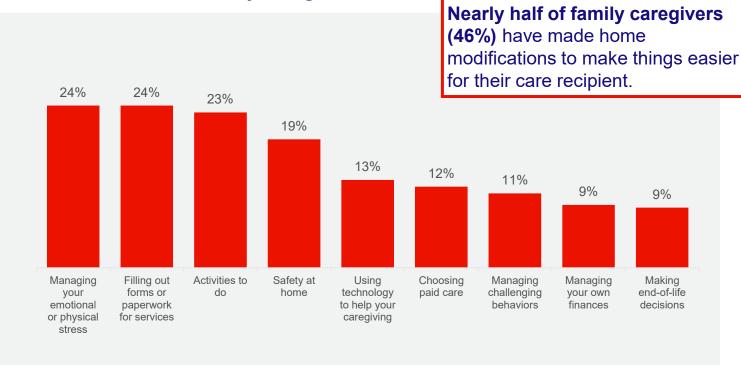
One in four family caregivers (27%) have difficulty getting local affordable services such as delivered meals, transportation, or in-home health services.

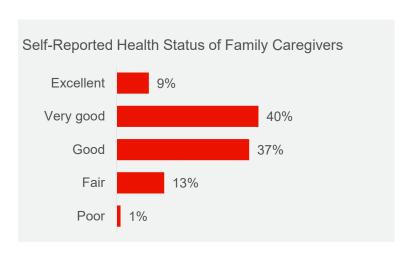

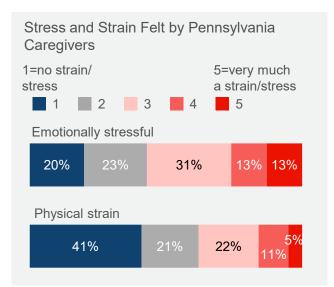




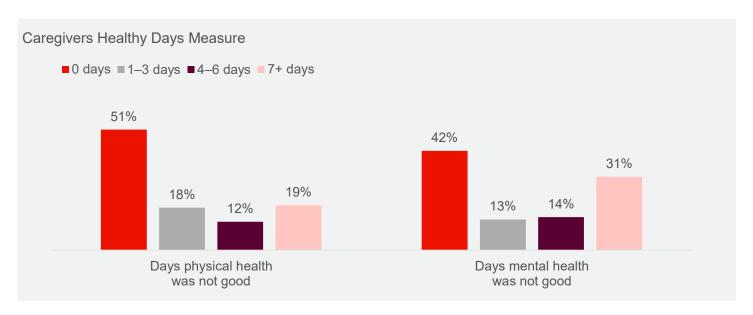


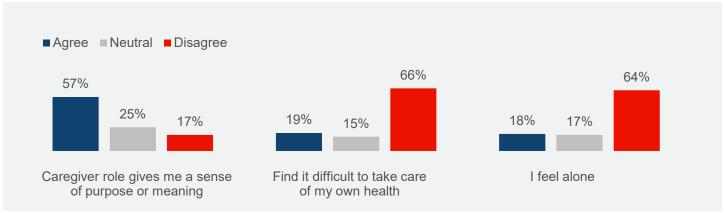
Well-Being of Family Caregivers





Two in ten family caregivers experience seven or more days a month of poor physical health. One quarter of caregivers (26%) experience high emotional stress while caregiving. One in five (19%) have difficulty taking care of their own health while they focus on their care recipient's needs. Eighteen percent (18%) feel alone while caregiving.
