## **Hispanic/Latino Family Caregivers**

## **SUMMARY**

Hispanic/Latino family caregivers face significant physical and financial impacts from their caregiving responsibilities, yet many also find their experience meaningful. They tend to be younger caregivers (under the age of 50) and more often have children at home while caregiving. They are more likely to have the person they care for live with them, and

to provide high-intensity care, such as longer hours of care or more complex care tasks. While caregiving can take a toll on their health and lead to physical strain, they are more likely to seek respite care and report a strong sense of purpose in their caregiving role.

## **DATA HIGHLIGHTS**

16% of all family caregivers are Hispanic/Latino

**60%** are **younger** caregivers

43% have children under 18 in their household

45% live with care recipient

**56%** provide **high-intensity** care

27%
report caregiving makes it difficult to take care of their own health

**28%** report **physical strain** as a result of caregiving

**58%** report that caregiving gives them a sense of purpose
